FAQs:

Q: How much does the CELTA cost?

A: The total cost for the CELTA is \$3,300 which includes course materials and exam fees.

Q: What are the course dates?

A: 8 May 2017 to 2 June 2017 (full time)
4 September to 29 September 2017 (full time)

Q: How much time do I need to spend on CELTA each week of the course?

A: The CELTA course is intensive. You will be at school for approximately 8 hours each day and will have assignments and lesson planning to complete in the evenings. You will also need to allow around 8 hours for homework over the weekend.

Q: Do I need teaching experience to do the CELTA?

A: No! The CELTA is a pre-service course. It is ideal for trainees with little to no teaching experience.

Q: What if I've never studied grammar before?

A: The CELTA pre-course task helps prepare you for the language you will need on the course.

Q: How will I be assessed?

A: You will be assessed throughout the course and there is no final examination. The two types of assessment are:

1. Teaching practice	You will teach for a total of 6 hours, working with adult classes at a minimum of two levels of ability. Assessment is based on your overall performance.
2. Written assignments	You will complete four written assignments (each 750–1,000 words). These focus on: <ul style="list-style-type: none">• analysing and responding to adult learner needs• analysing language for teaching purposes• teaching language skills• reflecting on classroom teaching.
